More Than Just a Phrase

Cell service returned to my phone half an hour after heading home from my spring break service trip to the Farm. I ignored the texts and instead googled "Bethlehem Farm." Thirty minutes later, my application to return as a Summer Servant was ready for submission. This is the joy of Bethlehem Farm—the nearly instantaneous transition into a life that becomes incredibly difficult to leave. A place where "Welcome Home" is more than just a phrase.

Living in the city, I had begun to feel such a separation from myself and creation. I wanted

to get my hands dirty, be inspired by like-minded people, and unplug. I experienced so much more than this! As a Summer Servant, home crew allowed me to witness firsthand the growth of each person who visited the Farm. I loved nothing more than watching my new friends develop confidence in their relationships with each other and their faith. Being able to welcome crews after a day of work with a home-cooked meal showed me the joy of self-gift every evening, just as group prayer demonstrated the unique gifts of each volunteer every morning.

Appalachia allowed me to ground myself in the environment, turning my faith into action. I learned how to make rhubarb strawberry crisp for thirty people, how to build a sawdust toilet, and how to love with more of myself than ever before. I felt like I was finally making a difference. My love of nature manifested in discussions about earth and sustainability that left me with concrete ideas on how to better implement the cornerstones in my own community. Most importantly, I recognized the distinction between living on Earth and living with Earth.

I experienced most vividly the cornerstone of community as I was leaving the Farm. A flat tire delayed my departure. Caretakers and Summer Servants immediately came together to help me, changing my tire with the spare, packing me lunch, offering up their families' houses for the night, and asking me to let them know when I got home safe. The kindness and selflessness of everyone I met on the Farm is such a clear example of people living their faith — one that has inspired me to carry a more intentional mindset into every day of my life.



Falling

Autumn of this year marks the inauguration of the West Virginia Waterfall Trail. What can the hundreds of waterfalls in this mountainous landscape teach us about falling?

When swimming in the crisp, clear currents at Sandstone, a 1,500-foot wide drop on the New River, I think about this poem from Rilke's Book of Hours:

"How surely gravity's law, strong as an ocean current, takes hold of even the smallest thing and pulls it towards the heart of the world... this is what the things can teach us: to fall, patiently to trust our heaviness."

Rilke reminds us falling is inevitable—throughout our lives, we will repeatedly make mistakes, experience failure, and live into imperfections—and yet, every one of those moments is an opportunity to fall deeper into loving union with God. In other words, falling can be a beautiful (though sometimes scary) transformation experience.

Even The Big Fall of Adam and Eve might be seen as a gift. As theologian John Aurelio points out, God saw that creation was good. Good is different from being the best or perfect or free from suffering. As the name of his book explains, there have always been Mosquitos in Paradise. Adam and Eve have to



go through the difficult journey of eating from the Tree of Knowledge to begin to see the world as God sees it. Falling is part of a journey to see with greater clarity the heaven that already exists here on earth.

As autumn settles in, let us trust the forces that pull us together towards the Source of Life, knowing we will be transformed. Let us learn from the water droplets courageously sailing down cliffs and then reuniting as one body running downstream. May we welcome the fall, trusting that God is with us through it all.

Repairing Homes, Renewing Communities Program Gearing up to Meet Increasing Need

At its April meeting, the Board of Directors saw the need to conduct an operational review of our Repairing Homes, Renewing Communities local service program.

There are several aspects to this review:

- Project Prioritization: With 50 households on our waiting list, so many urgent projects, and
 fewer service providers in our area, we are refining our process for deciding the types of
 projects we accept and the order in which we take on projects, helping us to manage and
 reduce our current 2-year backlog.
- **Client Onboarding:** We are updating our low-income home repair application and contract, as well as our client screening procedures.
- Leadership model: We are determining the ideal leadership structure for the program.
- **Site Leader Training:** We are further developing home repair training materials, resources, and strategies for current Home Repair Site Leaders and onboarding of future Caretaker site leaders.
- Funding Strategies: We are considering which fundraising strategies are best-suited for the program, including which grants and programs enable the best use of staff time and resources.
- Client Case Management and Referrals: We receive many calls for projects that are either outside of our service area or outside of our capabilities and mission, so we are updating and expanding contacts for regional service providers in order to help people in need find help.

We are already seeing fruits from this concerted effort to update our protocols and focus our energies on those projects where we can make the highest impact with the skills we have. Please hold us in prayer during this time of discernment and reach out to us with any ideas of your own.
